The Birth of the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks



In 1865 the Confederate Army had surrendered at Appomattox Courthouse, Virginia bringing an end to the Civil War. The railroads were moving westward, Mark Twain publishes the "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County."

In 1866 General Philip H Sheridan took command of the US forces in the West, proposing to bring peace to the plains by exterminating buffalos. "Kill the buffalos and you kill the Indians" he said. At the same time Frank and Jesse James started their

legendary criminal careers.

In 1867 Nebraska entered the Union, and the US purchased Alaska, and a young Englishman arrived in New York City. Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian was born in Exeter Devonshire County, England. His goal for coming to the United States was to continue in his pursuit in becoming an actor.

His first stop on arriving was at the Star Hotel, a "Free and Easy" owned by John Ireland, near Broadway. It was there he met Richard Steirly, also an Englishman who played the piano at the hotel. His relationship with these gentlemen resulted in the opportunities he was looking for in his pursuit.

In November of 1867 Richard Steirly went to the American Theater to take notes for orchestrating some of Vivian's songs. From there they all went to Sandy Spencer's place, on Broadway. Here they met Hughey Dougherty, Cool Bridges, and Henry Vandermark. As drinking men have been known to do, a challenge was made to shake dice for the refreshments.

Vivian not knowing anything about dice showed them a new game using corks. Each man was to drop the corks on the bar and retrieve them on the count of three. The last man to pick up his cork was to buy the round of drinks. Thus the Jolly Corks were born. The "corks" as they were called established a group of men with Vivian as the "Imperial Cork." The men were all professional, semi professional entertainers with a sprinkling of legitimate actors.

In December after they attended a funeral of a friend, they stopped at another place owned by Tony Pastor and were introduced to more actors in the community including George McDonald. After hearing of the story of the funeral, McDonald suggested that they should organize a group that would become "a protective and benevolent society.

At a meeting on February 2nd 1868, presided by Vivian, George McDonald offered a motion to organize "the Jolly Corks' as a lodge along the benevolent and fraternal lines providing that a committee be appointed to formulate rules and regulations for its government, prepare a suitable ritual, and select a new name. Vivian having in mind an English organization, "The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffalos," favored the name the "Buffalos." The majority was desirous of bestowing a distinctly American title for the new organization.

On February 16, 1868 the committee reported recommending that the "Jolly Corkers" be merged in to the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks. The recommendation was adopted by a vote of 8 to 7. Vivian favoring the "Buffalo" name was finally brought around to favor the name of "Elk". Thus was the birth of the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks.

The month of May has 2 important days to fly our flag, May 17th, Armed Forces Day and May 26th, Memorial Day.

On August 31, 1949, Louis Johnson, who was the United States' Secretary of Defense, announced the creation of an Armed Forces Day to replace separate Army, Navy and Air Force Days. The event stemmed from the armed forces' unification under one department – the Department of Defense. The Army, Navy and Air Force leagues adopted the newly formed day. The Marine Corps League declined to drop support for Marine Corps Day but supports Armed Forces Day too. Armed Forces Day was a day for the military to show "state-of-the-art" equipment to Americans. It

was also a day to honor and acknowledge Americans in the armed forces. Parades, open houses, receptions and air shows were held at the inaugural Armed Forces Day. Armed Forces Day is still celebrated nationwide today and is part of Armed Forces Week.

Memorial Day started when General Logan gave his official proclamation in 1868, to have a day set aside to remember and honor those who gave their all for their country. Moina Michael conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial day in honor of those who died. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to help servicemen in need.

This is the Pledge of the B.P.O.E since 1917.



From the start of WWI, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks has supported our veterans. Here is a little history. In 1917, the World was at war. The Order of Elks was only 49 years old. In April of that year, Grand Exalted Ruler Edward Rightor appointed a committee to study what the Order of Elks should do in this crisis. The Committee was ordered to present its

findings to the Grand Lodge Session in July.

During the July Grand Lodge Session held in Boston, this Committee, headed by Past Grand Exalted Ruler John K. Tener, reported to the membership and recommended, "That the Elks give first consideration to the sick and wounded on the battlefields of France and equip base hospitals for their care; that the Order create a fund for war relief work".

During World War I, under the auspices of the War Relief Commission, the Elks helped the nation to victory. Through the patriotism and generosity of our members, the Commission organized and equipped the first two base hospitals to reach France,

In 1918, to accommodate the maimed and wounded, the Elks built a 700 bed Reconstruction Hospital in Boston and gave it to the federal government. This hospital was the forerunner of the VA Medical Centers we have today.

More than seventy thousand Elks served in the Armed Forces during World War I. The supreme sacrifice was paid by over one thousand Brothers.

Right after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Grand Exalted Ruler John S. McClelland sent a telegram to President Roosevelt placing the Order of Elks at the nation's disposal. McClelland then called a special session of the Elks National Defense and Public Relations. From this meeting on January 4, 1942 was born the Elks War Commission.

The United States Army asked the War Commission to help recruit 45,000 young men for the ground crews of the Army Air Corps. The Commission, with the help of the local Lodges, recruited 97,000 men.

Look for more historical information next month. Be proud to be an Elk and always be thankful to our veterans for their service.

Palmetto Elks #2449 House Rules

- All outside entrances to the club facilities will be secured at all times. Entrances during operating hours may be gained by the use of current key card or admission by a member or employee after proper identification
- Only regular members in good standing of BPOE #2449 will be issued current key cards by the Lodge Secretary. The use of a key card is limited to whom it is issued.
- All visiting Elks in good standing will be admitted to the club facilities by displaying a current membership card from their home Lodge after signing our guest register.
- 4. All individuals entitled to a BPOE #2449 identification card will by admitted to the club facilities by displaying their current identification card.
 - a. The Lodge Secretary will issue identification cards to spouses of current members in good standing of Palmetto Elks #2449
 - b. The Lodge Secretary will issue identification cards to unmarried widows of deceased members of Palmetto Lodge #2449 In good standing. A request for this card shall be in writing to the Lodge Secretary and this application must be approved by the Elected Officer of Palmetto Lodge #2449
 - c. All holders of Lodge identification cards must be 21 years of age.
- 5. A valid membership of identification card is issued by any subordinate Lodge of the BPOE America must be shown in order to obtain service at the bar, or dining room and only authorized holders may purchase beverages in the club. Under no circumstances will unauthorized individuals be allowed to purchase alcoholic beverages.
- 6. The club hours will be established by the Corporation.
- 7. Conduct and dress in the Lodge building are expected to reflect the high ideals of Elkdom keeping in mind Elks are nice people doing great things together. Certainly loud, boisterous vulgar or obscene language is prohibited and shall not be tolerated.
- 8. No beverages whether alcoholic or non-alcoholic, regardless of the type of container will be brought into or carried from the premises except those purchased for the Lodge use.
- 9. Persons appearing to be inebriated or those who have imbibed to excess will not be served further alcoholic beverages.
- 10. All automobile, trucks or other motor vehicles that are parked in the paved parking lot will be within the designated lines.
- 11. No animals or pets of any kind will be allowed in the building with the exception of Service Dogs.
- Check will be cashed for members of BPOE #2449 and any other Elk in good standing by the management.

The Club Manager shall insure that these rules are strictly enforced and shall report any violation to the Board of Directors.


