Dear Bother/Sister Elk,

The homeless, hospitalized veterans and our active duty military personnel we support need your help: the physically and mentally challenged children of Florida whom we provide for need your help; and those less fortunate and in need of our assistance nationwide and throughout our local communities need your help.

Elks of Palmetto Lodge are proud of our meals, functions and activities that we provide at the lodge and within and outside of the federal health care facilities for our homeless and hospitalized veterans at Bay Pines Veterans' Medical Center in St. Petersburg. This is in keeping with our long time commitment that "As long as there are veterans, the Elks will never forget them."

Nationwide we are the third largest provider of college scholarships to high school seniors. Our Hoop Shoot (free throw) contest had over 3 million contestants last year. The American Essay contest and Soccer Shoot Outs attracts hundreds of thousands of participants last year.

Our professionally trained physical and occupational therapist employees are currently treating over 300 physically and/or mentally challenged children per week at the parent's residences and numerous others with major hearing impairments are being treated on a contact basis. We provide these services free of charge to families who have no insurance and are unable financially to afford professional treatment.

We have developed far and beyond on of the finest youth camps in the USA. Each year we provide camping experience and other facility usage for thousands of children and adults to include physically and/or mentally challenged children, sever burn victims and free camping to children whose families are unable to afford such service. Our swimming pool has a special ramp where wheelchair confined children can be lowered into the pool to join their parents. and siblings. "No Man Stands As Tall As He Who Stoops to Help A Child".

If you have not paid your dues yet please do so. Also if you have any friends or relatives that you think would like to join ask them.

October 1st 1946 - Twelve Nazi war criminals were sentenced to be hanged at Nuremberg trials- Karl Donitz, Hermann Goring, Alfred Jodl, Hans Frank, Wilhelm Frick, Ernst Kaltenbrunner, Wilhelm Keitel, Joachin von Ribbentrop, Fritz Saukel, Arthur Seyss-Inquart, Julius Streicher, and Alfred Rosenberg.

October 2nd 1942 – Enrico Fermi and others demonstrated the 1st self-sustaining nuclear chain reaction under Stagg Field at the University of Chicago.

October 3rd 1789 – George Washington proclaimed the 1st national Thanksgiving Day to be Nov 26.

October 4th 1943 - Aircraft from USS Ranger sink 5 German ships and damage 3 in Operation Leader, the only U.S. Navy carrier operation in northern European waters during World War II.

October 6th 1949 - American-born Iva Toguri D'Aquino, convicted of being Japanese wartime broadcaster Tokyo Rose, was sentenced in San Francisco to 10 years in prison and fined \$10,000.

October 6th 1961 – JFK advised Americans to build fallout shelters from atomic fallout in the event of a nuclear exchange with the Soviet Union. October 7th 1943 – Approximately 100 U.S. prisoners of war remaining on Wake Island were executed by the Japanese.

October 8th 1952 - Korean Operation RED COW, a joint Navy -Air Force mission against enemy positions near Kaesong, was conducted with Navy F2H Banshee fighter jets from Task Force 77 providing fighter escort for Air Force B -29 Super Fortress bombers.

October 9th 1942 - The first three schools for enlisted WAVES open at Stillwater, OK (Yeoman), Bloomington, IN (Storekeepers), and Madison, WI (Radiomen).

October 10th 1913 – Panama Canal was completed when President Woodrow Wilson triggered a blast which exploded the Gamboa Dike by pressing an electric button at the White House in Washington, D.C.

October 11th 1968 - Apollo 7, The first manned Apollo mission, was launched from Cape Kennedy with astronauts Wally Schirra, Donn Fulton Eisele and R. Walter Cunningham aboard. It made 163 orbits.

October 12th 1960 – Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev disrupted a U.N. General Assembly session by pounding his desk with a shoe during a dispute.

October 14th 1947 - Air Force test pilot Charles E. "Chuck" Yeager (24) flew the experimental Bell X-1 [Bell XS-1] rocket plane aircraft and broke the sound barrier to Mach 1.07 for the first time

October 15th 1974 – National Guard mobilized to restore order in Boston school busing.

October 16th 1940 – Benjamin O. Davis, became the U.S. Army's first African American Brigadier General.

October 16th 1962 – The Cuban missile crisis began as President Kennedy was informed that reconnaissance photographs had revealed the presence of missile bases in Cuba. October 17th 1973 – Arab oil-producing nations announced they would begin cutting back on oil exports to Western nations and Japan; the result was a total embargo that lasted until March 1974 and caused oil prices to quadruple.

October 18th 1867 – The United States took formal possession of Alaska from Russia.

October 18th 1987 - President Reagan summoned congressional leaders to the White House to announce he had decided on what action to take in response to an Iranian missile attack on a U.S.-flagged tanker off Kuwait two days earlier. The next day, U.S. destroyers bombed three Iranian offshore oil rigs in retaliation.

October 20th 1820 – Spain sold a part of Florida to US for \$5 million.

October 20th 1950 – In the first airborne operation of the Korean War, 2.860 paratroopers of the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team jumped between Sukchon and Sunchon, 25 miles north of Pyongyang.

October 22nd 1954 - As a result of the Geneva accords granting Communist control over North Vietnam, U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized a crash program to train the South Vietnamese Army.

October 22nd 1962 – President John F. Kennedy announced that missile bases had been discovered in Cuba and they had the potential to attack the United States with nuclear warheads.

October 23rd 1921 - Four unknown soldiers from the cemeteries of Asine-Marne, Meuse-Argonne, Somme, and St. Mihiel were brought to the Hotel de Ville in France for final selection to commemorate the sacrifice of the 77,000 American servicemen who died during World War I. The selection of the first unknown soldier to be buried at Arlington National Cemetery was made at the Hotel de Ville.

October 24th 1929 - Black Thursday—the first day of the stock market crash which began the Great Depression. Dow Jones was down 12.8%.

October 24th 1962 – The U.S. blockade of Cuba during the missile crisis officially began under a proclamation signed by President Kennedy.

October 25th 1962 – U.S. ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson presented photographic evidence of Soviet missile bases in Cuba to the U.N. Security Council.

October 26th 1962 – JFK warned Russia that the US would not allow Soviet missiles to remain in Cuba.

October 28th 1962 - The Cuban Missile crisis comes to a close as Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev agrees to remove Russian missiles from Cuba in exchange for a promise from the United States to respect Cuba's territorial sovereignty.

October 29th 1971 – The total number of U.S. troops remaining in Vietnam drops to 196,700 – the lowest level since January 1966.

Palmetto Elks #2449 House Rules

- All outside entrances to the club facilities will be secured at all times. Entrances during operating hours may be gained by the use of current key card or admission by a member or employee after proper identification
- Only regular members in good standing of BPOE #2449 will be issued current key cards by the Lodge Secretary. The use of a key card is limited to whom it is issued.
- All visiting Elks in good standing will be admitted to the club facilities by displaying a current membership card from their home Lodge after signing our guest register.
- All individuals entitled to a BPOE #2449 identification card will by admitted to the club facilities by displaying their current identification card.
 - a. The Lodge Secretary will issue identification cards to spouses of current members in good standing of Palmetto Elks #2449
 - b. The Lodge Secretary will issue identification cards to unmarried widows of deceased members of Palmetto Lodge #2449 In good standing. A request for this card shall be in writing to the Lodge Secretary and this application must be approved by the Elected Officer of Palmetto Lodge #2449
 - All holders of Lodge identification cards must be 21 years of age.
- 5. A valid membership of identification card is issued by any subordinate Lodge of the BPOE America must be shown in order to obtain service at the bar, or dining room and only authorized holders may purchase beverages in the club. Under no circumstances will unauthorized individuals be allowed to purchase alcoholic beverages.
- 6. The club hours will be established by the Corporation.
- 7. Conduct and dress in the Lodge building are expected to reflect the high ideals of Elkdom keeping in mind Elks are nice people doing great things together. Certainly loud, boisterous vulgar or obscene language is prohibited and shall not be tolerated.
- 8. No beverages whether alcoholic or non-alcoholic, regardless of the type of container will be brought into or carried from the premises except those purchased for the Lodge use.
- Persons appearing to be inebriated or those who have imbibed to excess will not be served further alcoholic beverages.
- 10. All automobile, trucks or other motor vehicles that are parked in the paved parking lot will be within the designated lines.
- 11. No animals or pets of any kind will be allowed in the building with the exception of Service Dogs.
- Check will be cashed for members of BPOE #2449 and any other Elk in good standing by the management.

The Club Manager shall insure that these rules are strictly enforced and shall report any violation to the Board of Directors.

We are requesting your help in getting Congress to pass Re: H.R 2794 Perpetual POW/MIA Stamp Act. Representative Gus Bilirakis of Florida's 12th congressional district is the bill's sponsor. If enacted the bill would provide for the issuance of a forever postage stamp to honor the sacrifices of the brave men and women of the Armed Forces who are still prisoner, missing, or unaccounted for, and for other purposes.

Terry Haberle and Jim Lamb have been working on this project since January 2014 when we had our Army of Hope fundraiser. Bill Allen, a Korean prisoner of war for over 2 ½ years was our guest speaker. He told us about this bill and the fact that it was going nowhere in the House of Representatives. During the fundraiser Bill posed the following question, "If the Beatles can have a postage stamp honoring them why can't we have one for our brothers that are missing in action."

This hit a few of us very hard. Soon after that event, Terry started researching H.R.2794 and this is what she found:

Status: The bill was assigned to a congressional committee on July 23, 2013, which will consider it before possibly sending it on to the House or Senate as a whole.

Prognosis: 18% chance of getting past the committee and only a 4% chance of being enacted. Only 11% of bills make it past committee and only about 3% were enacted in 2011–2013. A sample petition that can be used by your Lodge to help galvanize member interest and support for this bill. Lodges can send their signed petitions to me at the address shown below.

At this point we have received approximately 10,000 signatures on a petition, but we still need your support if this bill is to become a reality. It is very probable that only public pressure will bring H.R. 2794 to the floor for a vote. As Elks we need to show that WE DO CARE and are committed to our military personnel.


