From the Exalted Ruler

The month of November reminds us of what we have to be thankful for:

- ◆ In 1621, The Plymouth Colonists and the Wampanoag Indians shared an autumn Harvest Feast. The three day celebration giving thanks to God for his blessings on a bountiful harvest.
- ◆ 1863, when, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of *"Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens"*.
- ◆ In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: *"To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."*
- ◆ May 1938 the word "Armistice" was replaced with the word "Veterans." With the approval of this, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.
- ◆ June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.
- ◆ Later that same year, on October 8th, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation"

History of Veteran's Day



World War I – known at the time as “The Great War” - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of “the war to end all wars.”

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a concurrent resolution on June 4, 1926, with these words:

Whereas the 11th of November 1918, marked the cessation of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations, which we hope may never again be severed, and

Whereas it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this date should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations; and

Whereas the legislatures of twenty-seven of our States have already declared November 11 to be a legal holiday: Therefore be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), that the President of the United States is requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the officials to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Veteran's Day



Veteran's Day seeks to honor and give thanks to all the men and women who have served and are serving in the US Armed Forces. At 11:00 a.m. EST, the Veterans Day National Ceremony is held at Arlington National Cemetery. At this ceremony the President of the United States, or his assigned ambassador, lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Veteran's Day is observed on November 11th each year. Please join the Elks at the Bay Pines Hospital for the picnic November 8th.



Wounded Warrior Sargent First Class Gregory Robinson & Family



On October 10, 2015 Jim Lamb, PDDGER of Sarasota South Elks #2495 with Colonel Ben Kinsley welcomed Sargent First Class Gregory Calvin Robinson and his family. The Sargent and his wife Amanda, and daughters six year old Drew, and three year old Dylan were flown in on a private jet at the Dolphin Aviation Airport in Sarasota Florida to spend a weeks' vacation at Long Boat Keys, in Florida where they had time to spend together.

After their arrival the family was treated to lunch at the Sarasota South Elks Lodge. Following the lunch the family were taken to a condo on Long Boat Keys. After a short time to rest and a walk on the beach, the family was given a hero's welcome at the Sarasota South Elks Lodge where 180 people were in attendance.

SFC Gregory Calvin Robinson has been in the Army for 18 years, has gone on four combat deployments and one peacekeeping deployment. In October 2006 he was wounded losing his leg supporting the Canadian Army during Operation Medusa.

After spending a year at Walter Reed hospital recovering, he was approached to start working on his medical release papers. The Sargent requested to see a higher ranking officer. He explained that he was not ready to leave the army. Arrangements were made for special training. SFC Robinson was the first amputee to graduate from the Army Air Assault School and went back to Afghanistan two more times in 2010-2011, 2012 and 2014.

When Col. Ben Kinsley first heard the story about SFC Robinson he contacted Jim Lamb, PDDGER from the Sarasota South Elks and the plan to bring the Sargent and his family got underway.

With help from the community the Sargent and his family were flown in a private plane owned and operated by Terry Tyler who volunteered his time to fly them in. Congress Vern Buchanan from the Florida 16th District arraigned for the family the use of a car from Sarasota Ford Dealership. The condo association, for their donation of the condo for the week. The local shops in the area that have opened their doors for the family to shop while here. The family will leave on Friday on a private jet flown from Rectrix Aviation by Gary Fiealand who is donating his time and plane. The girls were given a bag of toys and bicycles with donations from Sarasota South Elks Lodge, the family was also given money to help with their vacation.

On Friday October 16th. SFC Gregory Robinson and his family headed back to Nashville.

Sargent Robinson wants to thank Col. Ben Kinsley, Jim Lamb, VFW post #3233, Elks Sarasota South Lodge #2495, the Elks from the Mighty South West District, and the pilots for making him feel like a "rock star."
